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What an exciting time for our school and our association! To quote from a recent article promoting the school's open house that ran in both the Town Talk and the Cenla Focus:

"Bolton High School is renowned for its strength in the academic arena. U.S. News and World Report has ranked Bolton as one of the best high schools in the nation for the last three years in a row. Bolton students have the highest ACT scores in the parish, and Bolton has produced more National Merit Scholars than any other school in the area. Bolton offers 13 Advance Placement courses and has won the District Literary Rally for over 30 years. Students may enroll in college classes and virtual school courses as well as the regular curriculum. The academic expectations of Bolton High School translate into cold, hard cash—the graduating class of 2009 was awarded an amazing 2.5 million dollars in scholarship offers last year."

In addition to assisting members in sharing a rich heritage of BHS history, our association's mission is to continue to build and emphasize that heritage. Obviously based on the above, our current and recent student body and faculty are doing their part in building on it. Our association must strive to assist and support them. Towards that end, our Endowment/Gift of a Lifetime fund continues to grow each month, thanks in large part to our committee chair, Russ Marsh's aggressive efforts, and of course the generous donors themselves who care so much about Bolton High. Our campus beautification/brick walk project continues to progress also, and we are over halfway there in reaching the required number of bricks sold to physically start the project. The board has met with an architect who has drafted plans for an area in the hallway on the second floor outside the entrance to the auditorium. 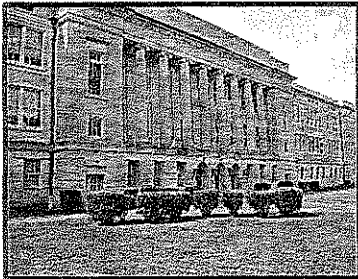

We Need Lifetime Members NOW!!

For the last three years in a row, *U.S. News and World Report* has ranked Bolton as one of the best high schools in the nation and has awarded us a silver medal, one of only 4 such schools in Louisiana. The ACT scores were well above the state and national average, and we have produced more National Merit Scholars than any other school in the area.

To help continue this excellence, the Alumni Association established a permanent Endowment Fund. The objective is to attract and award teachers of excellence, like the ones who taught us. In order to do this, we must reach a goal of \$100,000 before the reward program is activated. Thus far, we have donations amounting to over \$68,000. We only need 32 donors to step forward and help us complete this project.

The Louisiana Legislature just introduced House Bill 1033, which will require annual evaluations for teachers and administrators, allowing school boards to assess teachers' effectiveness, and reward those teachers who meet or exceed expectations. Our Endowment Fund project is right out in front of this proposal. Wouldn't you love to see Bolton achieve this sort of success and lead the state of Louisiana in doing so. We want the best students and teachers for Bolton and our Fund is definitely the means toward that end.

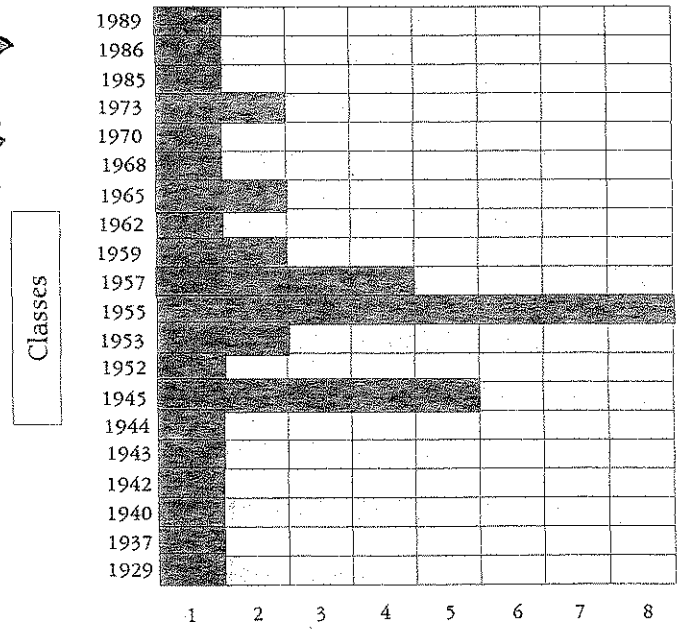

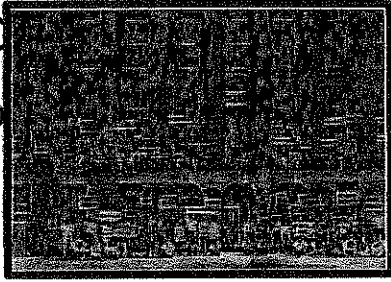

The Class of 1969 had a fantastic time at their reunion. They met Friday evening, March 19th at Bellino's for a good start to a great time.

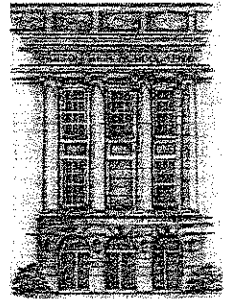
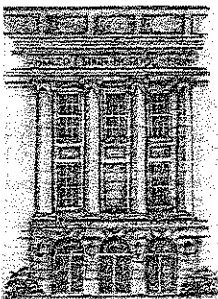

My Memories of Bolton



Bolton and World War II

"My memories of Bolton are wartime ones, (WWII, that is). Bolton graduates went straight to the armed forces, not to college, and the memorial plaque in the front hall gradually contained more and more names. Those of us in school at Bolton spent lots of time and effort in selling war bonds and stamps, and in putting on metal scrap drives. I've often wondered how the tinfoil balls everyone created from gum wrappers helped with the war effort. Our mothers spent their leisure time at the Red Cross wrapping bandages to be sent overseas. They were also greatly involved in figuring out how to shop for groceries to create meals with what was allowed with our ration stamps. Grocery stores had to add clerks to keep up with all the stamps to balance what they sold. Many families grew vegetable "Victory Gardens." I remember our family bought little biddies from the seed store and raised chickens for protein. Also, that was when milk bottles had cream at the top, and we skimmed it off and churned butter because we didn't like the margarine at that time. We all walked or rode the bus to school because gas was rationed (three gallons a week). Some of the senior boys' parents bought them Model T and Model A cars which were brightly painted with polka-dots, etc., and it was great fun to catch a ride with those who had them. Those of us who could get there would gather at Bridges Drug store after school and fill the parking lot and store while we consumed ice cream, root beer floats and drove Mr. Bridges crazy!"

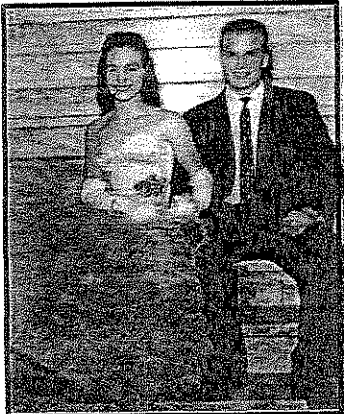

GAYLE, THE GHOST

As Freshmen arrive for their first day at Bolton, they hear many stories that have been handed down from generation to generation. For example, is there a swimming pool on the fourth floor? What to believe is the question. There is one story that leaves us wondering about the truth. What is the truth about the infamous ghost of Bolton, Gayle.

Legend has it that Gayle was a shy Bolton student in the 1920's. In hopes of getting Gayle involved in school activities, several teachers encouraged her to try out for the school play. Gayle reluctantly agreed to audition. Despite her awkwardness, she was given a role in the chorus.

Gayle did not overcome her timidity, and when her part called for a change of costume, she refused to disrobe in front of the other girls. She was told to change in a tiny, isolated dressing room above what is now called "The Green Room." The curtain rose, but as the chorus dance across the stage, a gap was noticed....someone was missing. A shrill scream sliced through the air as the lights blacked out. Lights soon returned and in the midst of all the hubbub, a crew member realized Gayle was the missing person. Several boys scrambled up the rusty ladder to her dressing room, but stopped dead in their tracks at the door. Blood streamed down the walls and over the furniture, but no body could be found. Rumor has it that if one looks up at the auditorium at night, a light can be seen in Gayle's room. It is especially visible from the stadium during football games. The room in question has been closed and built over during renovations. Some say the light is Gayle illuminating the upper rooms of the auditorium in search of her lost corpse.

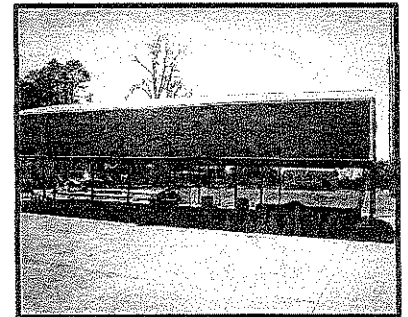
** Bolton grad is Rex, king of Carnival!! **

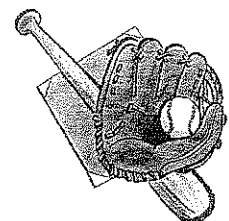
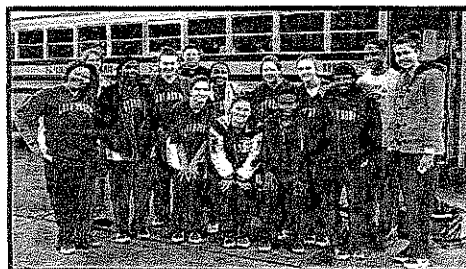
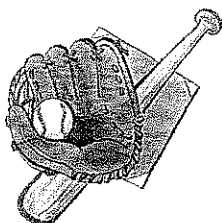

Margaret Waring

Architect and Design Artist
of the Brick/Walk Patio

Most of us are happy if we can do one thing well. For Margaret Waring, Class of 1974, being co-owner with her husband, Ray Braun, of Waring-Braun Landscape, a successful landscape architecture business, was not enough of a challenge. Several years ago, with two small children and a business to run, Margaret decided to take up the cello and began driving to Natchitoches to study with Richard Rose. After little more than a year of lessons, Margaret had made so much progress that she was invited to play with the Rapides Symphony Orchestra. Though she left the symphony last year to devote more time to her family, she continues to play in small groups for weddings and other special occasions, such as church services. Then, last spring, Margaret signed up for a wheel throwing class being taught at River Oaks. It did not take long for Margaret to become an accomplished potter, and she has a studio and exhibits at River Oaks.

Margaret attributes her love of art and music to early influences, both at home and at school. Her mother was an accomplished pianist and her family an audiophile, so her family had a large collection of records, especially classical, jazz, and Broadway musicals. She took piano lessons as a child, and her family attended many concerts and theatre productions. She was the third Waring in Chorale and Thespians at Bolton, and Mrs. Foil's art classes were a creative inspiration for her.

Her education at Bolton also prepared her well to enter college. Margaret says her teachers were very challenging, and they made the subjects interesting. She remembers Miss Adams as a brilliant math teacher with an easy laugh and a memorable smile. Mrs. Cox was a demanding English teacher, but students emerged from her classes knowing how to research and write competently, and with a broad appreciation for literature.

At the end of her sophomore year at Bolton, Margaret spoke with the guidance counselor, Marjorie Bengé, about college. Ms. Bengé told her about the profession of landscape architecture and suggested that Margaret's interests and aptitudes might make that a good career choice for her. Based on that advice, Margaret attended a two-day summer program for high school students at LSU's department of landscape architecture. She loved the program, but after graduating midterm in her senior year, she enrolled as a National Merit Scholar at Mississippi University for Women. Though she enjoyed her classes there, she found the campus somewhat isolated and eventually transferred to LSU, where she enrolled in landscape architecture.

Margaret met Ray in the landscape drawing class at LSU, and they married in 1980. In spring of 1981, they moved to Alexandria and became the first landscape architects in the city. On weekends in Alexandria, residents are sure to run into Ray and Margaret either working in a neighbor's garden during the day or attending one of our cultural offerings in the evening.
